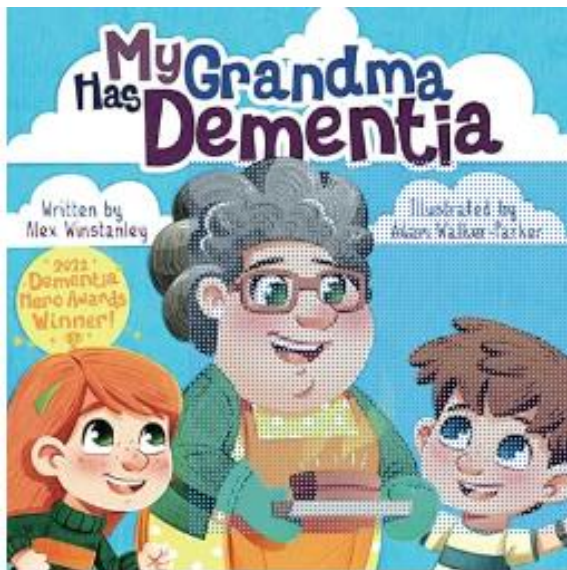
By teaching about the condition, young people can understand dementia and be more aware of how they can make a positive difference in communities now and in the future.
